What you need to register

To register on Grants.gov, applicants must:

1. Obtain a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) number;
2. Register with the System for Award Management (SAM) at www.SAM.gov;

Is My Organization already registered at SAM.gov?

To apply for grants to organizations through Grants.gov, your organization must be registered with the U.S Government through its System for Award Management (SAM.gov). Sign in and [search](#) to see if your organization is already registered.



If your organization is registered at SAM.gov, you can associate your SAM.gov account with your organization after you create your account. Your search results will include your organization's "Unique Entity ID" or Unique Entity Identifier (UEI). Ensure that your search results accurately reflect your organization. If so, note the UEI since you will need it to add a profile at Grants.gov.

If your organization is not registered at SAM.gov, go to [SAM.gov | Entity Registrations](#) to obtain a UEI.



The SAM.gov registration process can take up to TEN days!

Registering for Grants.gov account

- Registering with Grants.gov is a one-time process; however, processing delays may occur and it can take up to several weeks for first-time registrants to receive confirmation and a user password.
- It is highly recommended that applicants start the registration process as early as possible to prevent delays that may preclude submitting an application by the deadlines specified.

Check Application Status

After your organization submits application package(s) through Grants.gov, you can check the progress of the application(s). The **Check Application Status** page provides a list of all of the applications your organization has submitted. Depending on your roles and access levels, you may only be able to see applications you worked on.

Once the application enters the initial review process with the federal grant-making agency, applicants will need to use the agency's system to track further progress or status.

How to Check Application Status

1. Log in to Grants.gov.
2. Click the **Check Application Status** link, which appears under the **Grant Applications** heading in the **Applicant Center** page. This will take you to the **Check Application Status** page.
3. Enter search criteria and a date range to narrow your search results.
4. Click the **Search** button. To review your search results in Microsoft Excel, click the **Export Detailed Data** button.
5. Review the **Status** column. For more information, read the Application Statuses table below.
6. Review the **Actions** column:
 1. Click the **Details** link to view more detailed submission information.
 2. Click the **Related Submissions** link (if available) to view a list of submissions associated with the same funding opportunity package. Read the [Related Submissions](#) help article to learn more.

Application Statuses

The following are descriptions of the application statuses used to describe the progression of an application after submission through the Grants.gov system.

Status	Description
Receiving	The application has not yet been received by Grants.gov, but is processing normally, and is waiting in the queue to be received by Grants.gov.
Received	Grants.gov has received the application, but the application is awaiting validation.
FIFReceived	The application has been received by Grants.gov and is awaiting validation.
Packaging Process	The application is still being processed and will be validated within the next 48 hours by Grants.gov.
Processing	The application has been received by Grants.gov and has begun checking the application for errors.
Validated	Grants.gov validated the application and it is available for the agency to download.
Rejected with Errors	Grants.gov was unable to process your application because of an error(s) and cannot accept the application until you correct the error(s) and successfully resubmit the application. You will receive email providing the errors with the application.
Received by Agency	The agency has confirmed receipt of the application package.
Agency Tracking Number Assigned	The agency has assigned an internal tracking number to your application. This is the last status that Grants.gov tracks. Updates beyond this must be checked with the agency directly. Note: All agencies do not assign tracking numbers. If you do not see an agency tracking number, this does not infer that the agency did not receive or process your application. The assignment of tracking numbers is based on the policy of a particular agency.
Purged	The application has been on the system for 5 years or more and has been purged from the system. <i>Note: The application purge period was increased from 180 days to 5 years on October 20, 2015, so all applications submitted on or after April 22, 2015 will be stored for 5 years. All applications submitted before April 22, 2015 were deleted under the previous 180 day purge period.</i>
